"The Naval Civil War in Theaters Near and Far"

We are pleased that Dwight Hughes, who was unable to be with us for our October 3rd meeting, will be giving his presentation this month about the Civil War Navy.

Almost nothing in the history and traditions of the United States Navy prepared it for the challenges of civil war in the early 1860s. At the onset of the war both sides faced the challenge with a lack of foresight and preparation. They could not possibly envision what




eventually happened or the immense effort required to actively contribute to the war effort.



Dwight Hughes best summarizes his presentation about the Civil War Navy by saying, "the Civil War was principally a land conflict, but it was not only that; naval operations were more than just peripheral or supporting. Navy theaters of operation complete the picture, providing fascinating and enlightening perspectives on the conflict."

Guest speaker: Dwight Hughes is a graduate of the U. S. Naval Academy who served 20 years as a Navy surface warfare officer, received a Bronze Star for Meritorious Service as well as a Purple Heart while serving in Vietnam. He taught Naval ROTC, earned a MA in Political Science and and MS in Information Systems Management and a second career in software engineering.

He is also a Civil War historian, author, and speaker on naval history, combining his love of the sea with his fascination with Civil War history.

BCWRT is asking \$20 for each painting or \$50 for all three.




Notes from the October 2023 Board of Directors Meeting

Civil War Views

Chancellorsville Battlefield

These pictures are shared by BCWRT Advisor Skip Maxwell and his wife from their trip in September this year to Chancellorsville Battlefield at Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania National Military Park.

"The six-day Battle of Chancellorsville left behind a human wreckage unmatched in Virginia to that time. Lee won an unlikely victory, but lost Stonewall Jackson. The Union army (under General Joseph Hooker) retreated in a gloomy rain, but would soon be ready to fight again - at Gettysburg." *Trail sign at Chancellorsville*

In seventy-two hours the Chancellor family's world was turned upside down. A Union soldier described the Chancellor women on April 30:

"Upon the upper porch was quite a bevy of ladies in light, dressy, attractive spring costumes. They...stated they had assurances from General Lee, who was just ahead, that he was there anxiously awaiting an opportunity to extend the 'hospitalities of the country.' They had little conception of the terrors in store for them..."

Three days later Confederate artillery shells set fire to the house, forcing Sue Chancellor and the other women to flee.

"The sight that met our eyes as we came out of the dim light of that basement room beggars description. The woods around the house were a sheet of fire - the air was filled with shot and shell - horses were running, rearing and screaming the men, a mass of confusion moaning, cursing, and praying... At our last look, our old home was completely enveloped in flames."



Community Building at 223 E. Bay St. Dr. Chris Fonvielle will discuss his book <u>More Curious Tales</u> <u>from the Lower Cape Fear</u>. He will be talking about two of the five famous legends he covers in his book:

- Did Polly Slocumb really make a miraculous midnight ride to Moores' Creek Bridge to tend to her husband and other Patriot soldiers wounded in the battle in February 1776?
- Did the family of Nance Martin bury her in a cask of rum in which she had been placed after passing away on a round-the-world sea voyage with her father and brother in 1856? Today her grave is one of the most visited in Wilmington's historic Oakdale Cemetery.

Tuesday, November 14, 10:00 am, at the Harper Library, 109 W. Moore St, Southport,


Thomas Milner will present "The Ships of Southport."
